Game - Ten Commandments

Materials:

- Ten Commandments Text Page
- Ten Commandments Symbol Cards
- Ten Commandments Prompt Cards

Preparation:

- 1. Print all materials listed above.
- 2. Cut out the Ten Commandments Symbol and Prompt cards.

Object of Game:

- 1. Students read the Ten Commandments and explain their meanings.
- 2. Students recognize that God's commandments are founded in love.

Pre-Game Instructions (Examining and Explaining the Ten Commandments):

- 1. Place the Ten Commandments Text page and the Ten Commandments Symbol cards face up on a flat surface.
- 2. Read each commandment, one at a time, and tell students to identify the corresponding symbol card. Repeat exercise 1-2 times to build confidence.
- 3. Students state each commandment in their own words. Teacher provides guidance as needed.
- 4. Students sort commandments into groups: (1) Commandments that show love to God and (2) Commandments that show love to others. (Hint: All ten commandments show love to God.)

Game Instructions (Applying the Ten Commandments):

- 1. Place the Ten Commandment Prompt cards face down on a flat surface near the Commandment Symbol cards.
- 2. Decide who will go first and proceed clockwise.
- 3. The first player picks a prompt card and reads the statement aloud to the class.
- 4. Proceed as follows ...
 - a. Teacher asks, "To which of the commandment(s) does this statement apply?"
 - b. Students place the prompt card on top of the corresponding symbol card.
 - c. Teacher asks, "Does the statement describe "breaking" the commandment or "keeping" the commandment?"
 - d. Players can answer the question or consult a classmate.
 - i. If both students cannot produce the correct answer, the teacher can invite all other students to help answer the question, or supply the answer himself/herself.
 - e. The game then proceeds with the next player.
 - i. To avoid "stalling" or to keep the game moving, the teacher can impose a time limit to answer the questions.
- 5. What should we do when we realize that we have broken one of God's commandments? What does repentance demonstrate? How does repentance demonstrate love?
- 6. Students discuss the benefits of obeying God's commandments for (a) self, (b) others, (c) God.


Note to teacher:

If a prompt statement merits guidance, decide whether to address at that moment, or put the card aside and address after the game had ended.


Mosiah chapters 12 and 13

- 1. I am the Lord thy God. Thou shalt have no other God before me.
- 2. ...Thou shalt not make unto thee any graven image, or any likeness of things which are in heaven above, or things which are in the earth beneath, or which are in the water under the earth. And again: thou shalt not bow down thyself unto them, nor serve them...

- 5. Honor thy father and thy mother, that thy days may be long upon the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee.
- 6. Thou shalt not kill.
- 7. Thou shalt not commit adultery.
- 8. Thou shalt not steal.
- 9. Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.


