

The Amalekite Man - Skit
(Mosiah 27:11-18, Alma 15:5, Alma 21:1-10)

Narrator: King Mosiah's son, Aaron, was a missionary for Christ. He preached the Gospel of Christ to unbelievers called Amalekites. The Amalekites lived in a land called Jerusalem, which was called after the land of their fathers' birthplace. The Amalekites were after the order of Nehor, which was a religion started by a man named Nehor, who was anti-Christ. Nehor professed that all men would be saved, and repentance was unnecessary. Aaron entered into one of their synagogues to preach. He related his testimony of when an angel of God appeared to him and his brothers and commanded them to stop rebelling against God and His church. As he was speaking, an Amalekite man stood up and began to argue with him...

Amalekite man: What's this? You're saying that you've seen an angel? Why don't we see angels? Aren't we good enough to see angels? You said that unless we repent, we will perish. How do you know our thoughts and the intents of our hearts? How do you know that we need to repent? How do you know that we are not a righteous people? Narrator: Aaron began to open the scriptures and spoke about the coming of Christ, the resurrection of the dead, and that there could be no redemption for mankind save it were through the death and sufferings of Christ, and the atonement of His blood. As he began to explain these things the people became angry, and began to mock him. They rejected everything that he said.
